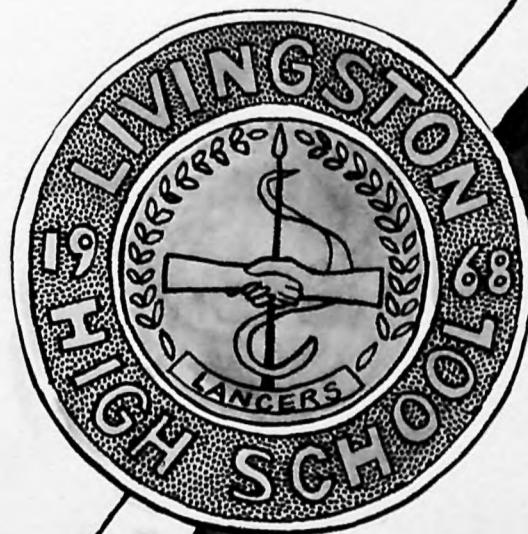

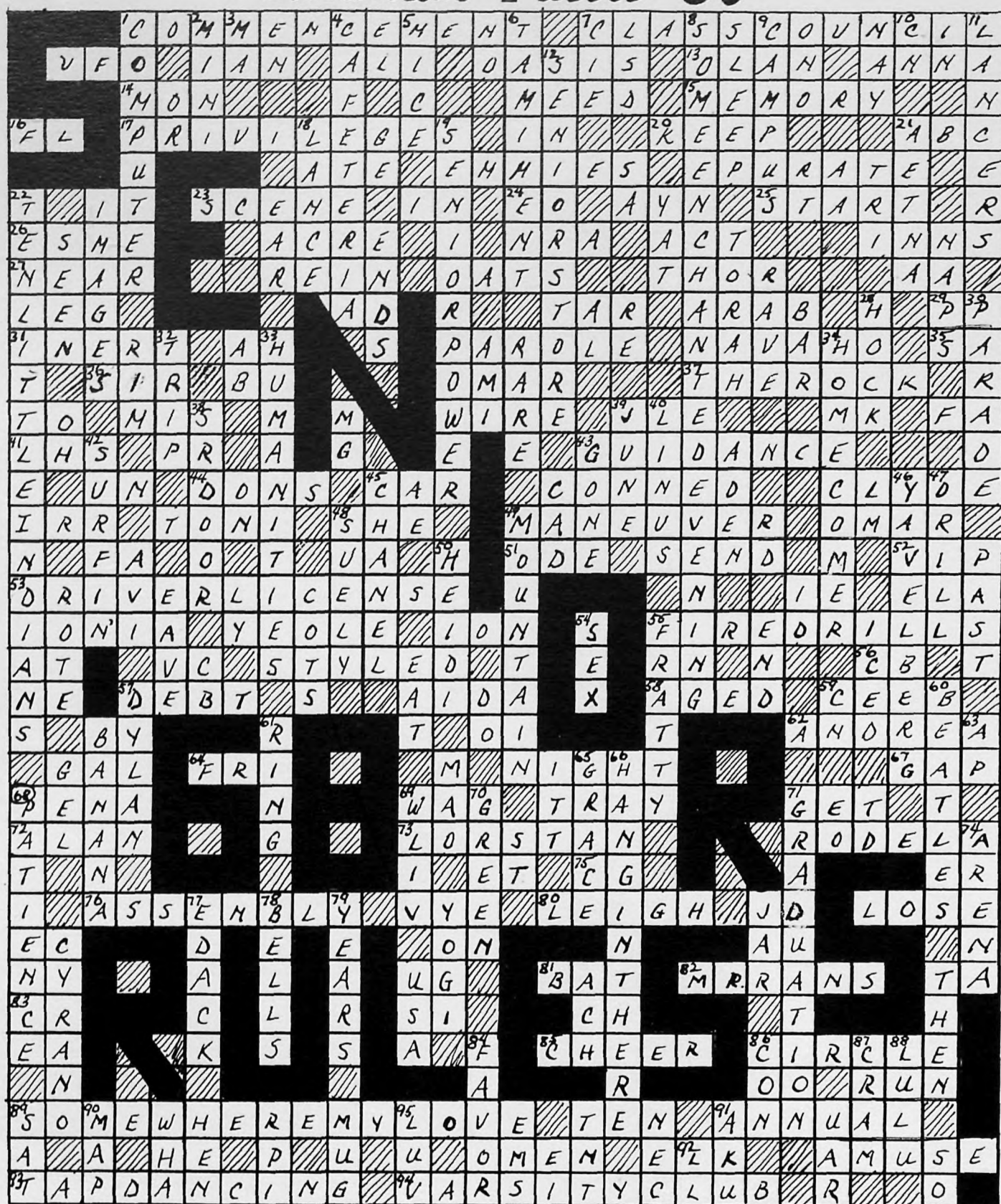

Crossroads Puzzle 68



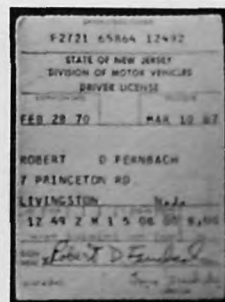

The Livingston High School football team of 1968 was definitely one of the best squads to perform on the gridiron in Lancer history. No Livingston football team has ever had more wins in a single season. The potent offense and defense justifiably received greater publicity, both locally and state-wide, than that of any previous team. This year's Millburn and Mountain games will long be remembered by both students and spectators for their excitement and sensational outcomes. Roger O'Neill's tremendous game-winning field goal, booted in the last 16 seconds, marked another "first" in L.H.S. history for the record-breaking '68 team.

One of the chief reasons for this year's success was the large nucleus of seniors. The Lancers were fortunate to have two fine captains, Rich Frey and Paul Sarn, Rich noted for his great running and pass-catching and Paul for his aggressive blocking and passer-catching. The Livingston interior line was one of the largest and toughest in the state. Tackles Cal Nordt, John Ialeggio, Al Harris, and Gene Marfuggi, guards Carl Vidal and Ken Arifian, and center Wally Seebald were the Lancer "rocks of granite." With speed and agility Bob Higgins, Roger O'Neill, Bob Bluhm, Marc Packin, and Ralph Jones showed what great defensive halfbacks can do to cripple the opponent's passing game. Aggressive linebacker Jack Henning and defensive-end Bob Csitkovits also contributed to Livingston's outstanding defense. On the offensive side, the fabulous passing of Kent Doyle and the spectacular pass receiving of Kevin Courtney gave the Lancer's a fine air attack. On the ground, small but tough Joe Louis continually sped across the goal line.

Post-season award winners were Paul Sarn, third team all-state, and Kent Doyle and Jeff Mathesius, honorable mention in the county. This year's football team has forged its way into Livingston's athletic foreground and has achieved its position in the annals of L.H.S. sports history.

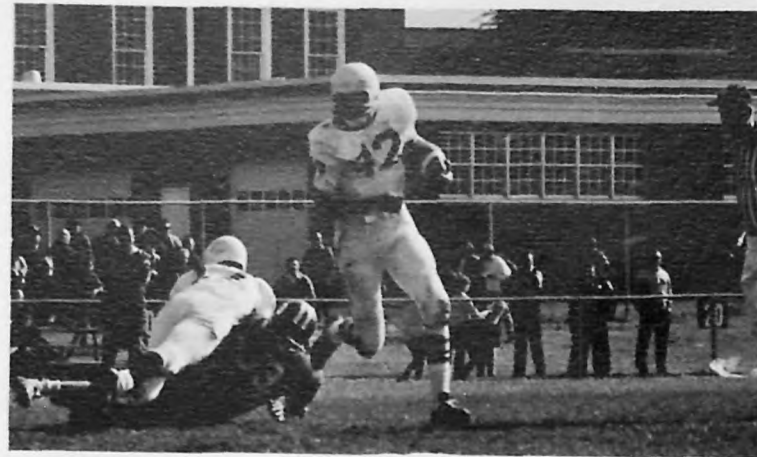

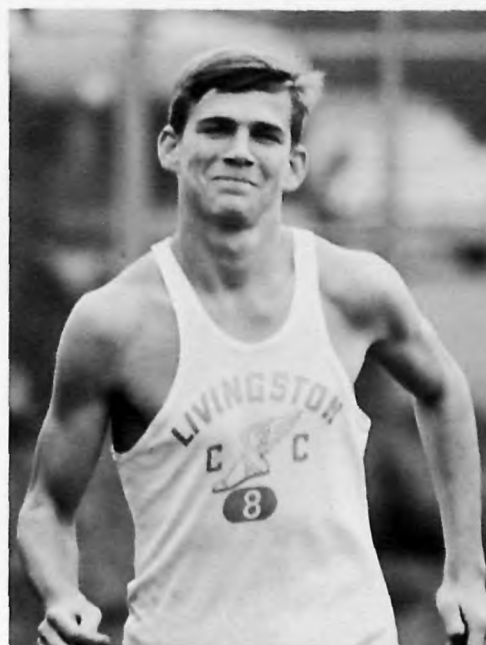


First row, left to right: R. Bellamy, G. Thurston, M. Mann, D. Hinds, J. Schnell.

All in all, the Lancer baseball team, centering around its fine seniors, continued to show what outstanding baseball teams Livingston can produce.

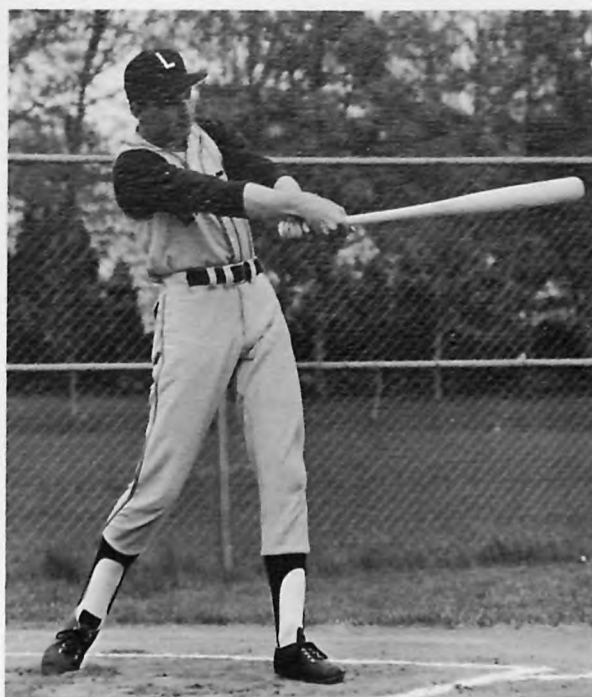

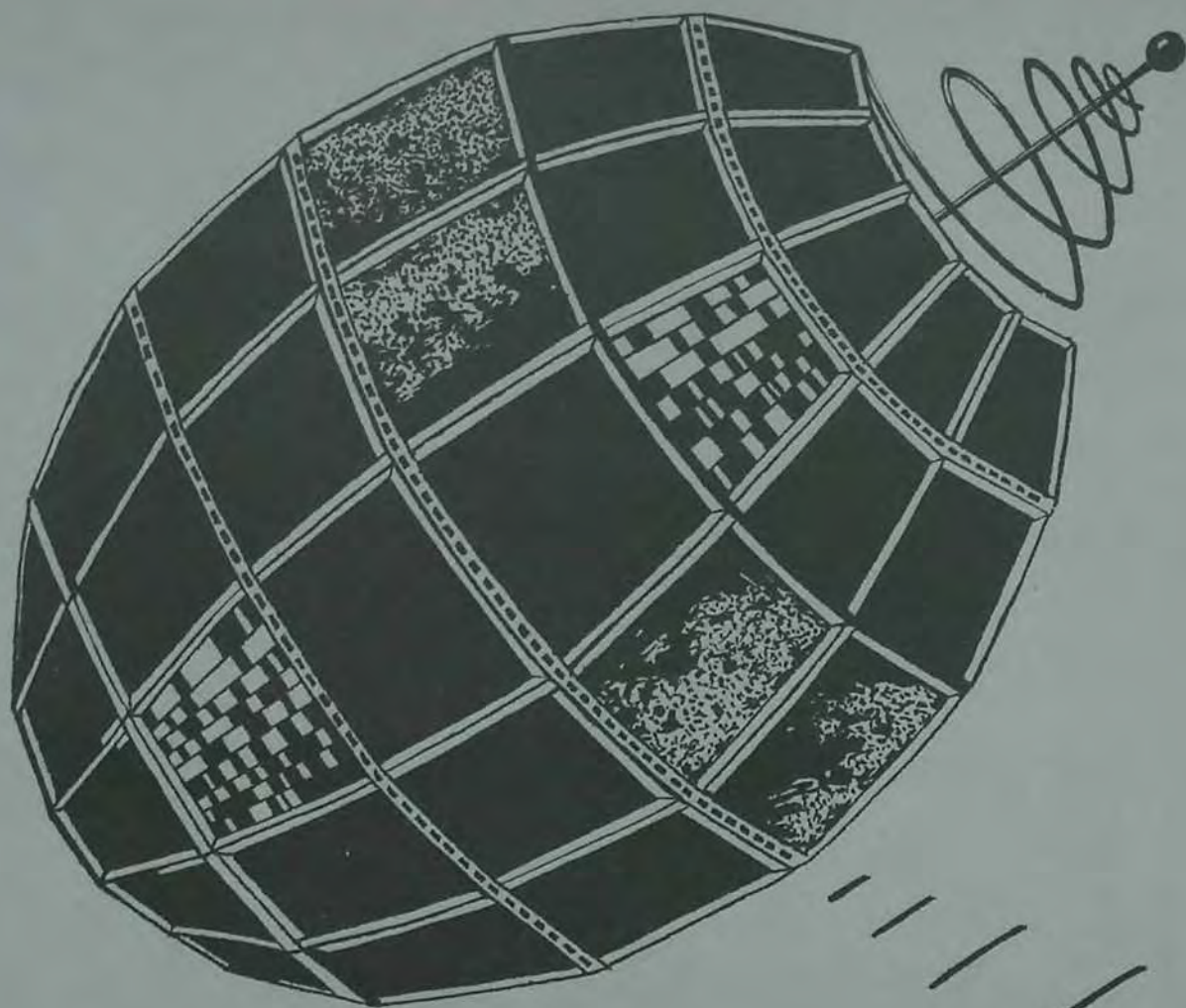


Farewell
