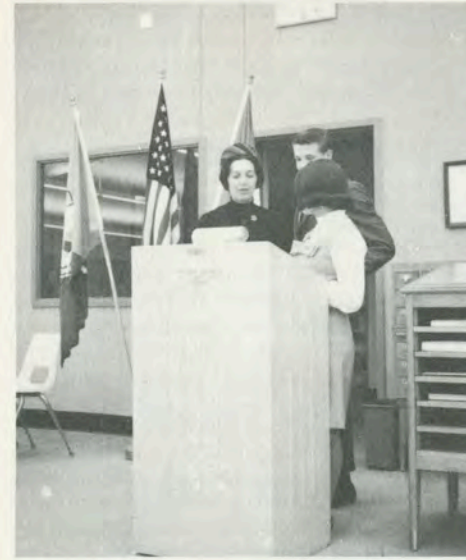

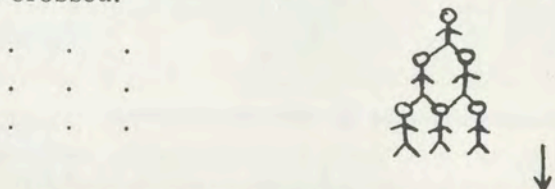

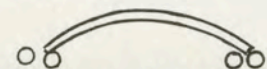

Mr. McMickle is involved in two

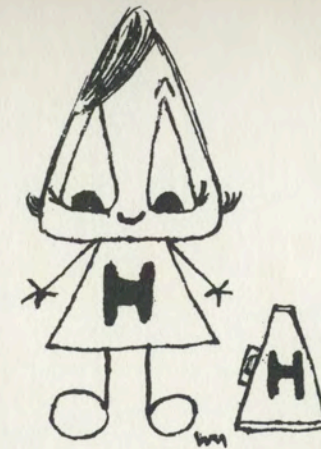
after school clubs: the Discussion Club, and the Track Club.

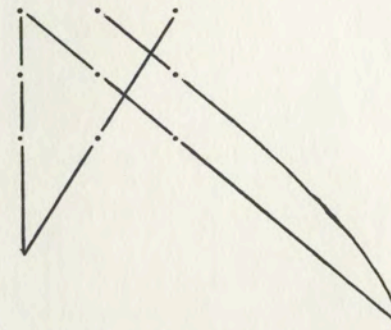
You can see he is an interesting personality for he leads a busy life. There isn't much Mr. McMickle doesn't enjoy doing.

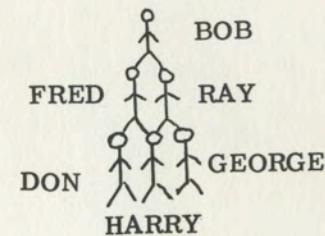
