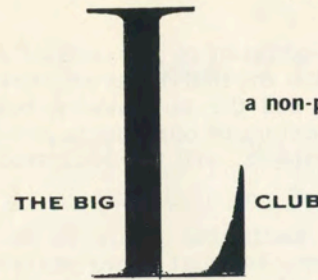

Lancer football '67 style should prove to be quite interesting. A good sprinkling of game-experienced players prevail both on the offensive and defensive units. Co-captain Rich Frey heads an offensive unit consisting of Joe Lewis, Jan Brosky, Kent Doyle, Cal Nordt and Kevin Courtney, all who played throughout the '66 season. Co-captain Paul Sarn leads Paul Smitko, Jack Henning, Bob Higgins, Mark Packin and Roger O'Neill in forming a solid nucleus for this year's defense.

Ends Al Harris and Bob Bluhm showed great improvement as the year progressed and should be strong contenders for the end positions. Ken Arifian and Carl Vidal could earn the open guard positions vacated by graduated seniors. Ralph Jones alternates at offensive end and defensive back. John Collins, Gene Marfuggi and Mike Carrington can "make" the team in many ways if they recuperate from injuries and illnesses which kept them from participating this past year.

Our sophomore squad shows many eager youngsters who are going to make their presence felt as juniors this year. Mike Duffy, Mike Duguid, Doug Felderman, Jay Kiskel, Ed Lewis, John Lyons, Rich Bonas, and Pete Steffen all saw considerable service playing in the sophomore and junior varsity games both as offensive backs and/or defensive backs. Interior linemen with good size and good speed should make John Jacobi, George Kramer, Al Hellman, Chris Klug, Marc Minnion, Barry Packin, Frank Robina, Steve Saran, Gene Thaw, Dave Van Cott, John Nunez and Wayne Doring strong contenders for openings along the offensive and defensive line. Centers Barry Shapiro, Ed English, and Dave Cramp should add good reserve strength to the important center position. Players like John Aylward, Jeff Jacenty, Mark Ruths and Al Tinquist have shown the desire and the ability to play any and all positions when called upon, and should prove a valuable asset in the Lancer's football fortunes this year serving in the same capacity.

A quick analysis of strengths and weaknesses of the Lancers of '67 shows a good nucleus of game-seasoned veterans on both offense and defense. On paper, offensive backfield strength and depth appears very solid with the need for an additional back-up quarterback being a top-priority item in the Lancer stock. Offensive guards have been depleted by graduation and this area should offer a good number of candidates a very keen challenge. Offensive ends show real good size and speed. The center position shows a definite void in experienced personnel.

The best defensive team in Livingston Football history has several interior gaps to fill, a backer up vacancy and one deep back spot, all vacated through the graduation of these key players. Though we had the great fortune of having straight two-platoon teams last year, it is very doubtful if this year's team will enjoy this same luxury. As a result, many boys will be doubling up in some capacity.

Roger O'Neill will again handle all of the punting, kicking off, and extra point place kicks in his same thorough manner. We are anxiously looking forward toward his being the first in Livingston football to kick a field goal.

A change in the schedule finds Columbia replacing Passaic Valley, and there is an overall change in the order of the conference games as compared to previous years. An example of this is West Essex appearing in place of Parsippany for the annual Thanksgiving Day game.

Line Coach Tony Hope and End Coach Bill Graham once again will assist with the varsity squad and Rudy Valentine and Bob Batitto will handle the sophomores.

Another close race seems to be in the offing with Hanover Park heading the list of the so-called pre-season favorites. Stubborn resistance will be furnished by Morristown, Morris Hills and West Essex. Boonton may be a year away with a freshman team that walloped everybody. Mountain has its entire backfield returning, and don't overlook those hustling Lancers as far as conference honors are concerned.

The Lancer Soccer team concluded the 1966 season with a respectable overall 10-4-3 record but finished third in the Jersey Hills Conference behind champions Morristown and runnerup West Essex. The Livingston squad advanced one round, with a sound 4-0 win over Jersey Hill champs Morristown. Trenton High eliminated the Lancers, 3-2, in a tight, well-played contest in the state tournament.

Thurston Beats Record

One of the highlights of the 1966 season was the high-scoring of Co-Captain Dave Thurston. Dave ended the season with 26 goals, four better than Irv Jacobson's single season high of 22 set in 1959. Thurston was considered one of the best scorers in the state finishing in a runnerup position for the Fred Coggin Soccer Award. This award is given each season to one of the outstanding players in the state. The award went to goalie John Krygowski of Bloomfield High School.

Other outstanding performers on the 1966 squad included goalies Jim Rynar and Gary Naylor, fullbacks Bob DiFranco and Co-Captain Pete Seggel, half backs Ken Tindall, Rich Cox, Dennis Nakonechny, Ed Perara and Fred Porter, linemen Lou Naugle, Dave Osten, Roger Eckhart, Joe Pannucci and Mike Cifrodelli.

Prospects for the Future

This season's prospects are uncertain. A somewhat loose defense will have to be tightened but veterans Jim Rynar in the goal and fullback Bob DiFranco should give the deep defense some strength. Bill Egner, injured most of the season, may possibly work into the backfield along with several J.V. prospects. Other returning veterans will be Mike Chimes, Jeff Earle, Fred Porter, Tom Stadtman, Lou Naugle, Mike Cifrodelli and Rob Shannon.

Returning linemen include the second-high scorer, Mike Cifrodelli, Lou Naugle and Bob Shannon, all lettermen. A large measure of the Lancers success will be dependent on locating the "big scorer." Perhaps one of the aforementioned linemen will do the job or a J.V. or sophomore prospect.

All Essex County Selections

The Lancers had the honor of occupying three first team spots on the 1966 All-Essex County Team. Thurston, the Lancers high scorer, was picked as one of the linemen while Co-Captain Pete Seggel, Livingston's fine fullback, and Ken Tindall, Lancers steady, center halfback, were also chosen. Lou Naugle received an honorable mention.

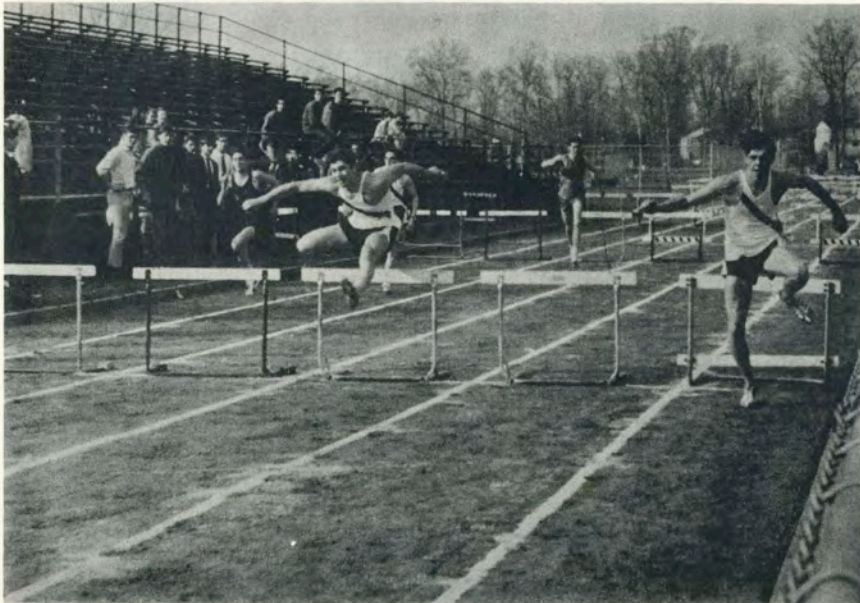

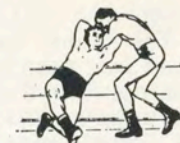

The Lancer grapplers will hit the mats this season minus their all-time star Ed Anderson. Ed, three-time district champion and school record holder with 40 wins, 7 losses and 2 ties will not be easily replaced. According to Coach Dave Wade, "Ed has to be considered the most outstanding wrestler to have ever wrestled for Livingston High School. Someone will have to be Regional or State champion to ever take Ed's spot in the annals of Lancer wrestling!"

LAST SEASON

The Lancers fell off their throne last season and posted a dismal 5-7 win/loss record. On four occasions, the Lancers fell short by just one bout of winning the match. Four more wins could have made a big difference for the teams win-loss record and title aspirations.

In addition to coming close and falling short so many times, the Lancers fell to Boonton a new arrival on the scene and this had to be the worst defeat in Lancer wrestling history, even though the score was a close 26-22. Hanover Park also came back from the brink of what would have been a glorious upset for the Lancers by nudging out the hometown boys 21-20.

LACK OF BALANCE

This season finds the Lancers searching for talent as they never have before! Five seasoned letter winners return, but with twelve weight classes to fill, it should prove very difficult this year. Led by co-captains, Rich (11-1), 106 lbs., and Steve Garber (7-4), 115 lbs., the team has seniors Cal Nordt (9-3) heavyweight, Ed Fogel (10-2), 178 lbs., and Carl Vidal (9-2-1), 148 lbs., returning with outstanding records. Other letter winners returning will be seniors, Mark Miller (156) and Wayne Vanden Heuvel (123) and hopefully they will come into their own this year to pick up their wins where the team needs them.

Junior Jay Kiskel wrestled most of last season in either the 136 lb. weight class or the 141 lbs. class and was considered the utility man. This season Jay will be out to find himself a set place in the line-up and come into his own as a fulltime performer. Also junior letterman, Jerry Gaeta, 98 lbs., will be out to show what a year of varsity experience can do.

JUNIOR VARSITY COMING UP

The junior varsity team did not look too impressive as a team last season, but did boast of a few good prospects. Dave Cramp, 178 lbs., the only novice tournament runner-up on the team could help but might have to wait a year because of Ed Fogel's hold on that position. Marc Parker, heavyweight, and winner of the most improved JV wrestler award, will be locking horns with big Cal Nordt for that position.

Some other JV hopefuls will be Doug Feldermann, Dean Kohl, Paul Smitko, and Jeff Mathesius. Anyone or all of these grapplers have the ability to wrestle varsity if they come into their own this year. Many times a wrestler develops from one season to another and the Lancers are certainly depending on this if there is to be any success this year.

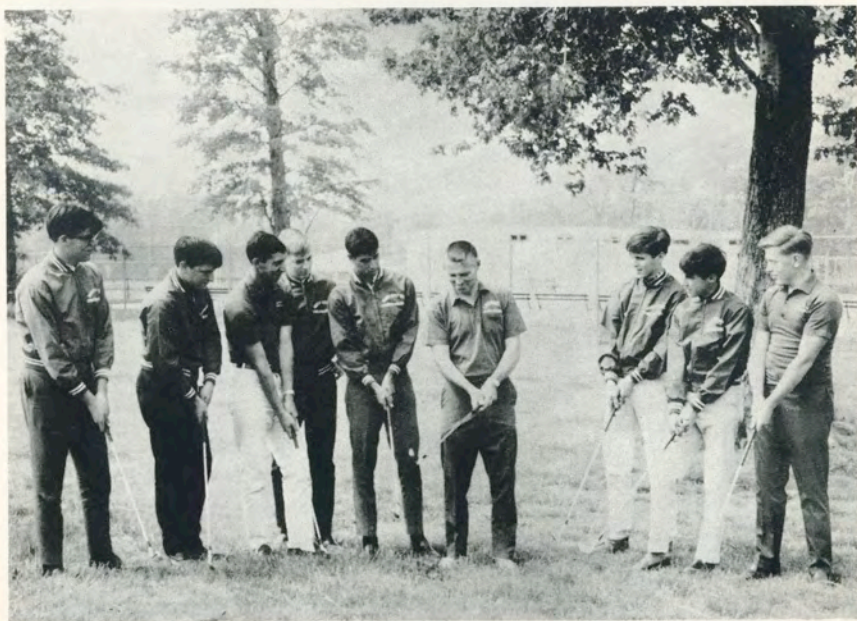

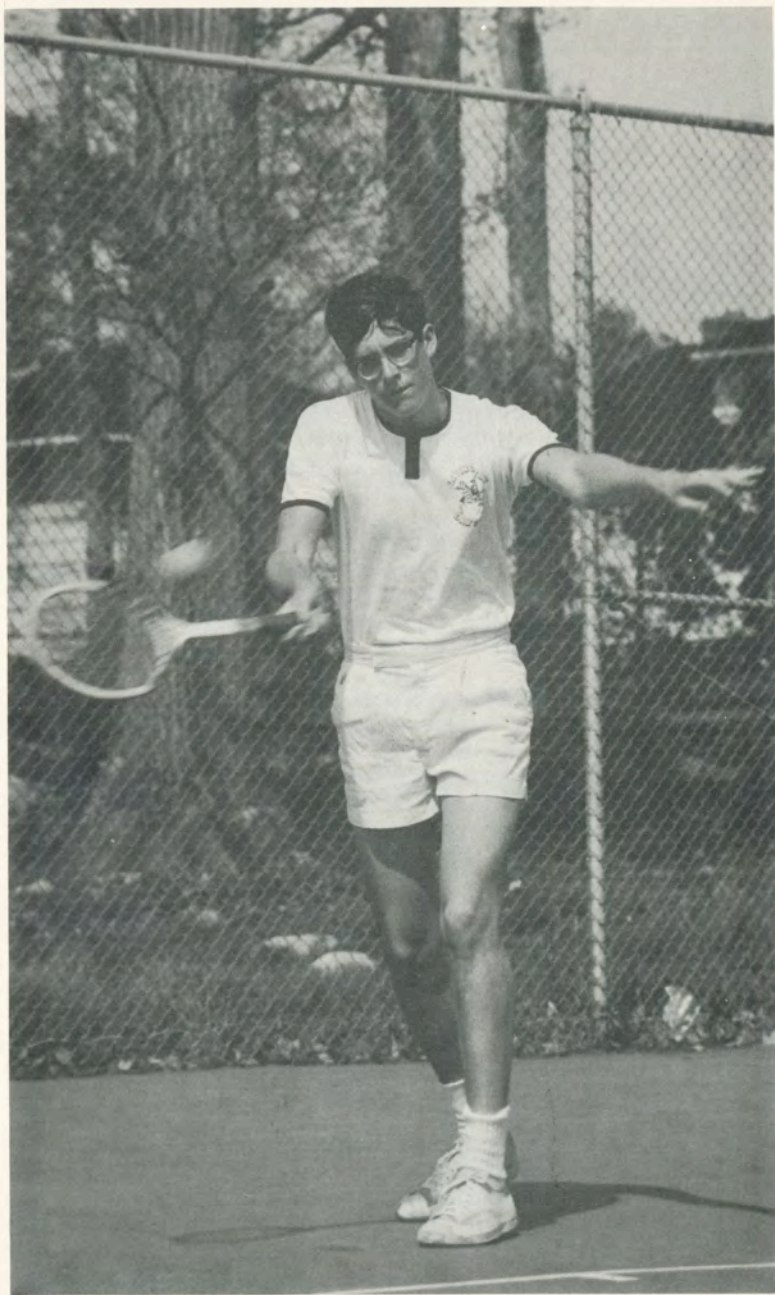

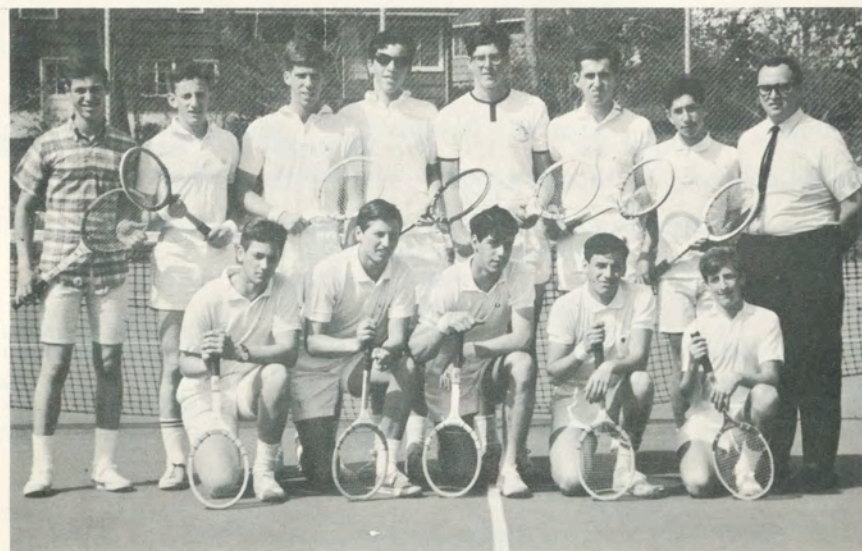
